## Dramatic Exchanges

### New Organs for Old

(Stories and photographs of "2-headed dogs" created by Soviet scientists have called dramatic attention to experiments in Russia to determine how far mankind can go in transplanting the vital organs of one body in another. Dr. Vladimir Demikhov, whose work with dogs has stirred the medical world, suggests that ultimately there may be no limit to human transplantations—of hearts, lungs, and other body parts. Demikhov, 43, has been experimenting in transplants since he was a student of Moscow university 19 years ago. Since 1957 he has headed the research laboratory for transplantation in the Sechenov First Moscow Medical Institute.)

MOSCOW—Many people die prematurely without reaching old age owing to failure or dis-

ferred from one body to another and included in the blood circulation of the new organism continues to function. The heart continues to contract rhythmically, the kidneys to excrete urine, the lungs to enrich the blood with oxygen and to give off carbon dioxide, etc.

If an organ—for instance the heart—be taken from the corpse of an organism which has perished from an accident, the heart being uninjured, then, on being included in the blood-circulation of the new organism this heart will quickly revive and begin to function satisfactorily.

### BRAIN TIE SHORT

The possibility of reanimating the human heart was scientifically proved first by Prof. A. A. Kulyabko who in 1902 revived the heart of a man 20 hours after death. Later, Prof. S. V. Andreyev, a Soviet scientist, succeeded in resuscitating a human heart 112 hours after death. On the

in some cases lived for more than a month.

### HEAD TRANSPLANT

We have now succeeded in discovering the causes of premature death. In the near future it will be possible to prevent and eliminate these causes.

A graphic proof of this is offered by an experiment in transplanting the head of a puppy onto the neck of an adult dog. In our former experiments a grafted head had lived no more than six days and this period was considered an impassable limit by some scientists. However, one of our dogs, recently lived for nearly a month with a second head on its shoulders.

We are not planning to transplant a human head, but such experiments with animals enable us to study many problems pertaining to the transplantation of human tissues and organs, as well as a number of questions in other fields of experimental medicine and biology.
